# ABOUT US

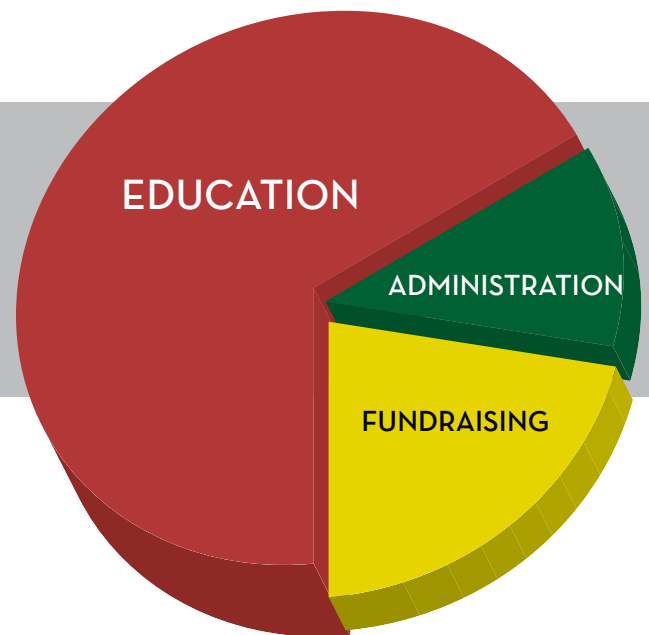
Founded in 1984, the Dallas Holocaust Museum/Center for Education and Tolerance is dedicated to preserving the memory of the Holocaust, and to teaching the moral and ethical response to prejudice, hatred and indifference. Located in Dallas' Historic West End, the Museum hosts more than 65,000 visitors annually, among them 30,000 school children.

We are one of only 19 Holocaust museums in the nation and the only one serving North Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana. Along with our permanent collection, the Museum presents special exhibits several times each year which highlight diverse aspects of human rights and genocide worldwide.

Visitors to the Museum are provided with the tools they need to understand human and civil rights and the ramifications of silence and indifference to the suffering of others. Our visitors are encouraged to consider individual responsibility, to think about moral and ethical choices, and to make important connections between historical crises and developments in today's world.



67 cents of every \$1 spent at the Museum went toward educational programming in 2013.



# PROGRAMS

- **Permanent and special exhibitions** of the highest caliber with docent and audio-guided tours
- **School tours for children** grades 5 through 12 and College Nights for post-secondary students
- **Holocaust and human rights workshops** and professional development conferences for teachers
- **Lectures by survivors**
- **Curriculum trunks, "mini libraries,"** loaded with research materials that are loaned to local schools for use with students in grades K-12
- **Traveling seminars for educators** who live outside easy driving distance of the Museum, including East Texas and Oklahoma
- **Artifact archive and research library,** including recorded testimonies of survivors
- **Socialization programs for survivors,** refugees and hidden children
- **Plays, concerts, panel discussions and receptions** that highlight issues of the Holocaust and human rights worldwide

# 2015 Exhibits

## **The Wartime Escape: Margret and H.A. Rey's Journey from France**

The exhibit chronicles the Curious George authors' escape from Paris in 1940. The Curious George manuscript was among the few belongings the Reys, both German Jews, took with them. The exhibit features art prints, books, toys and supplemental archival images. The show will also contain pieces from a private Dr. Seuss collection, which explores Theodor Seuss Geisel's evolution from World War II-era political cartoonist to progressive children's book writer.



## **9/11: Ground Zero 360**

A critically acclaimed touring exhibit the Museum is bringing to North Texas for the first time, 9/11: Ground Zero 360 honors the victims of the 2001 terrorist attacks and commemorates the heroic lives of the New York City police officers, firefighters and other first responders who put themselves at risk to save others.

## **Holocaust By Bullets**

Father Patrick Desbois, a French Catholic priest, has spent more than a decade identifying and examining previously undocumented sites where Jews were exterminated by Nazi mobile units in the Ukraine during WWII. This exhibit examines his research and presents artifacts from killing sites along with video testimonies from eyewitnesses – many of whom are speaking publicly for the first time. Father Desbois' extraordinary work helps preserve the memory of Ukraine's former Jewish community and advances understanding of the horrific crimes committed there.



# 2015 Programs

## **Upstander Speaker Series**

The Museum continues its successful lecture series for a second year. The series brings renowned international speakers to engage the community, address the challenges of hatred, discrimination, and indifference and inspire listeners to stand up and face those challenges. The speakers -- including journalists, legal scholars, civil rights experts, victims of hate crimes and others -- address historical topics surrounding the Holocaust as well as modern-day genocides and timely issues of bigotry, prejudice and bullying.



## **Museum Experience Fund**

It is the Museum's goal to allow anyone -- no matter their economic circumstances -- to visit the exhibition and experience its valuable lessons of tolerance and acceptance. Established in 2013, the Museum Experience Fund pays for admission and transportation costs for economically disadvantaged and Title 1 students whose parents and schools would not be able to afford to these costs. More than 5,000 students from DISD and other local districts and schools are expected in 2014.
